FROM THE PASTOR...JANUARY 2019

"Neither do men pour new wine into old wineskins. If they do, the skins will burst, the wine will run out and the wineskins will be ruined. No, they pour new wine into new wineskins, and both are preserved." (Matthew 9:17)

In Bible times, wine was not kept in corked bottles, but in water tight goat skin bags. When you made new wine, of course, it needed time to ferment which causes expansion and old goat skins which had expanded once and dried would burst. So new skins always housed new wine.

Jesus was answering the objections of the "old religion" folks like John the Baptists' disciples and the Pharisees that His followers didn't always do things the "old way" that the Law prescribed. Jesus' admonition is that the "new day" that was foretold by the Prophets had dawned in Him and that observance would be new to both mark and spread the message of His new day.

We live in the days of the dawning of the Word made flesh, the Bridegroom has come and nothing will be the same except the assurance and endurance of His glorious forgiveness and promise. We, the Body of Christ, are people of the new wine for that Word given to us to cherish and spread is new to and for every generation and their thirsts.

We confess that, like the Pharisees and Baptist followers, we too much love our old wineskins. We love the way we heard the Word, the way we worship before the Word, the way we adorn the Word in our church buildings...we just love our familiar old wineskins. But God's Word is new good news for every generation and new wineskins must be created to bring that bubbling, fermenting message to new people with different hearing capacity and new customs.

It is difficult for us, especially those of us who have been tending the wine a long time, to see new wineskins, new ways of presenting and spreading the Word. But we hear the counsel Jesus gives us about new wineskins. It is the sacrifice He asks of us that His Word might reach the needy. God's Word must speak to new generations in a new way because the challenges they face in life are immense and overwhelming and sometimes frightening.

I hope Emanuel will welcome a new Pastor this year. For that fresh blessing we all give thanks to God. But a new Pastor always brings new wineskins. A new Pastor and Lay Leadership, committed to bringing that Word afresh to new people, will inevitably ask Emanuel to adapt to some new ways. When they do, please, hear Jesus' voice asking you to embrace new wineskins for the sake of the spread of His Gospel and the growth of Emanuel.

God always takes care of all who labored faithfully over decades for His Word. God always takes care of His "veteran" laborers in the vineyard. And the traditions that count and console us will never be neglected as new generations are served. I pray that while we might shake our heads and chuckle at some of the new ways, we older vineyard laborers will remember that it's not about the old wineskins we fashioned and how much we like them...it's about the vintage for the Lord. It's about the quality of the wine for a new day and for other's thirsts.

Keep up your prayer for the Call Committee and for a God has anointed new Pastor. Remember you and that Pastor are seeking the will of the Holy Spirit and trust God's Spirit to inspire and work through the discernment process, and ultimately to make Emanuel a vineyard proclaiming a sweet vintage of His Word for new people in new and innovative ways that they might hear and have their thirst satisfied.
