

### **KEEPING FIRST THINGS FIRST**

"Do not be anxious." Jesus gives this command to His Jewish audience three times during His Sermon on the Mount. (See Matthew 6:25-33.) He tells His hearers not to worry about food, drink, or clothing, explaining how the God who provides for the flowers of the fields and the birds of the air will certainly provide for His chosen people.

During this sermon, Jesus talks about how unbelievers (the Gentiles) anxiously seek food, drink, and clothing, making it clear that focusing on the material needs of life as a top priority is opposed to God's will.

Jesus tells His Jewish audience that God already knows in advance what their physical needs are. Then He goes on to give them a command which, when followed, removes the need to be anxious about material needs.

"But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you." Matthew 6:33 (ESV)

Jesus wanted the top priority of His Jewish audience to be seeking God's kingdom and His righteousness. Jesus told them that they were wasting energy by worrying needlessly about their physical needs, because God provides these things as His people seek first His kingdom and His righteousness.

Matthew 6:33 is a command not only for the Jews who first heard it during the Sermon on the Mount. It is also a command for every member of Jesus' Church since its birth on Pentecost about 2,000 years ago.

Jesus commands all of us who are baptized believers to seek God's kingly rule over us every day, allowing Him to be in control of our lives as our Lord. And Jesus commands us to live in God's righteousness every day, our having been put right with our heavenly Father through Spirit-given faith in Jesus Christ as our Savior.

Prayer: Dear Father, as Your baptized children, we are commanded by Your Son Jesus to seek first Your kingdom and Your righteousness. Having received Your Holy Spirit in Baptism, may we employ the Spirit's gift of faith daily to obey this command given by Your Son. We trust You to provide for all of our bodily needs until that day when we join You in the fullness of Your kingdom. Dear Father, we give You thanks as we pray all this in the name of Your Son, Jesus Christ! Amen!

# Pastor's Perspective August 2022

"But as for you, continue in what you have learned and have firmly believed, knowing from whom you have learned it and how from childhood you have been acquainted with the sacred writings, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. 2 Timothy 3:14-15

In the coming weeks, many parents will be doing back to school shopping. The last weeks of summer are precious moments to get in some last vacation, but also to get ready for the coming school year. It is in the getting ready for the coming school year that I am writing about.

While this is geared toward parents, it is important for all of us to know what is happening in our schools and the important work ahead of the whole Christian Church. While this may come across to some as being a bit on the political side, I am writing to share this information and focus on the spiritual aspect what I'm writing.

In 2019, The Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey passed a new law, signed by Governor Murphy. The law requires all public schools to include in their instruction "...on the political, economic, and social contributions of persons with disabilities and lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people, in an appropriate place in the curriculum of middle school and high school students as part of the district's implementation of the New Jersey Student Learning Standards." This was to be implemented in school districts for the 2020-2021 school year but was delayed for implementation as a result of COVID until the 2022-2023 school year.

Now, this may seem rather innocent, especially when this is yoked with individuals with disabilities. However, the door has been opened for a much wider teaching than what the law adopted, particularly with regards to those identifying as lgbtqia+. What do I mean? Garden state Equality has provided an LGBTQ Inclusive Curriculum Program for schools to use which engages all grade levels (Yes, Kindergarten through 12 Grade) across all classes on pro-lgbtqia+. Lessons can be as simple as a kindergarten class practicing which pronouns they like to go by at school. Furthermore, because such lessons can be incorporated in all school subjects there is little ability to opt out of lessons regarding lgbtqia+. Parents should check their school's policies.

More disturbing is the guidance the New Jersey Department of Education is providing schools. "A school district shall accept a student's asserted gender identity; parental consent is not required. Further, a student need not meet any threshold diagnosis or treatment requirements to have his or her gender identity recognized and respected by the district, school or school personnel. Nor is a legal or court-ordered name change required. There is no affirmative duty for any school district personnel to notify a student's parent or guardian of the student's gender identity or expression. There may be instances where a parent or guardian of a minor student disagrees with the student regarding the name and pronoun to be used at school and in the student's education records. A parent or guardian may object to the minor student's name change request. School districts should consult their board attorney regarding the minor student's civil rights and protections under the NJLAD." This guidance allows school districts to keep you from knowing this important detail of our children's lives.

Some of you may wonder what this has to do with our congregation. The answer to that is simple. Children from our congregation will know classmates from school who are identifying as another gender, and they may be asked and/or demanded to use whatever pronoun their classmate chooses. It is also deeply concerning that school districts in our area may abide by this guidance from NJDOE and be keeping important information from parents. With all this said, there are things to keep before us.

- 1. The truth does not change. "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them. And God blessed them. And God said to them, 'Be fruitful and multiply..." (Genesis 1:27-28a.) While there are rare instances where some are born with atypical genitalia<sup>iii</sup>, the overwhelming majority of babies are born boys or girls.
- 2. Read the scriptures. The Bible is our authority in matters of faith and life, particularly how we live out our faith in daily life. Furthermore, be assured that at Emanuel we will teach what is found in the Bible as to how we live a life of faith.
- 3. Parents need to have open communication with their children. Be involved. Know what is going on in their lives. Reinforce the teachings of God's Word. "Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old, he will not depart from it." (Proverbs 22:6)

- 4. Pray. What we are seeing in this law and guidance from the NJDOE is an example of spiritual warfare. The devil is the master of deception and half-truths who desires to lead us away from God. Pray first of all for our children to be able to withstand the attacks of the evil one with the full armor of God (Ephesians 6:10-20). Pray also for those who have bought into the lies and are identifying as lgbtqia+. Pray for our school officials and teachers who are in the crosshairs of having to abide with state guidelines and those with the courage to stand against these guidelines.
- 5. Be kind. Kindness is a fruit of the Spirit. (Galatians 5:22-23). We can and should be kind to those with whom we disagree. Being kind doesn't mean we condone falsehood. It is also important that we demonstrate kindness and the love of God when that is not reciprocated.
- 6. Be aware of the policies of your school district and don't be afraid to speak out against those policies that undermine parental authority.
- 7. For those who wish to be further involved, I can provide you information about Team Protect Your Children. This group of New Jersey residents are Christians who not only pray for change but also lobby for changes in the law.

We are living in a world that is very different from the world God intended. As Christians, we are in the world, but we are not to be of the world. We do not follow the world's values, but the values that are the Kingdom of God. "But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will transform our lowly body to be like his glorious body, by the power that enables him even to subject all things to himself." (Philippians 3:20)

### **VALUES BIBLE STUDY**
