Emanuel Lutheran Church is a community of faith, leading people to Christ. Welcome to Advent and our journey to Christmas.

WHY AN ADVENT WREATH?

The use of an Advent Wreath and candles as part of worship is a relatively recent custom in the church. Originating among Lutherans in northern Europe from earlier cultural traditions, it has been adopted by many Christian denominations over the last few centuries. A German pastor created it in 1839 as a means to count down to Christmas for children.

Designating the names for the various candles is a *very* recent phenomenon (probably mid-20th century), and multiple traditions have developed. These often vary by denomination, region, religious publisher, and even in the literature of various candle supply companies!

Strictly speaking, there is no single set of traditional names for the candles; there are, in fact, many different traditions. Some of these names were related to old lectionary texts that are no longer in use. The most commonly used names among Protestants for the candles are the designations: 1) Prophets' Candle (Hope for the coming of Christ, 2) Bethlehem Candle, Love for those in need who have "no room" 3) Shepherds' Candle, Joy for spreading the message of Christ and 4) Angels' Candle, Peace on earth, as the message of the angels.

An even more recent tradition among various churches is to name the candles by Advent "theme" words, the most common four being Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace (or in the order: Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love). Since there is no single tradition regarding the names of the candles, in its materials, Sola has used the most common designation of:

Prophets' Candle, Bethlehem Candle, Shepherds' Candle, Angels' Candle.

Keep in mind: The use of candles in Advent is a human tradition, neither mandated nor prohibited in Scripture. There is no right or wrong in the use of these names. Local congregations are free to use what they choose.

"And to the true unity of the Church it is enough to agree concerning the doctrine of the Gospel and the administration of the Sacraments. Nor is it necessary that human

traditions, that is, rites or ceremonies, instituted by men, should be everywhere alike." (Augsburg Confession 7)

Pastor's Perspective

"You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect." Luke 12:40

On Sunday, November 27th the one holy catholic (Christian) Church will celebrate a new year with the season of Advent. The Advent season is one of preparation. On the one hand, we are preparing to celebrate the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ, the incarnate Word of God, born out of heaven through a virgin's womb (John 1:1, 1:14, Luke 1:31), whom God sent into the world to save us (John 3:16). On the other hand, it is a season in which we are reminded that Christ will one day return to judge the living and the dead (2 Timothy 4:1).

As you see from Luke 12:40 and other related verses, Jesus' return is going to come suddenly. The call for us as Christians is to be alert. Even Jesus himself does not know the time of his return. "But concerning that day and hour no one knows, not even the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but the Father only."

While no one knows the day or the hour, that hasn't stopped people from speculating on when Jesus will return. It is one of the great mysteries of the faith. Various scripture passages speak of being prepared for that day, as it will come like a thief in the night.

"For you yourselves are fully aware that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night." (1 Thessalonians 5:2)

"But know this, that if the master of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you must also be ready for the Son of Man is coning at an hour you do not expect." Matthew 24:43-44

Jesus speaks of the suddenness of his return using the image of virgins who let their lamps to meet the bridegroom. Only half of the 10 had enough oil. The ones who ran out of oil were unprepared and missed out on meeting the groom. "Watch therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour." (Matthew 25:13)

So, what shall we take from the unknown return of our Lord. I hold before you these things:

- 1. Do not be complacent. Another way to say it is to be prepared. Preparation is a spiritual one of scripture reading, prayer, worship, service and witnessing to the truth of Jesus. Such disciplines are not additions to our lives, but are the lifestyle we are called to live as followers of Jesus. So as parents, we are witnesses to Jesus to our children. So as employees, we serve our neighbors when we do our work honestly, with integrity and faithfulness. As Christians, we not only offer to pray for people, but to pray with them, in the moment, be it at the doctor's office, the shopping aisle, a parking lot or on the phone.
- 2. While we do not know when the Lord will return, we do know that each day brings us one day closer. When Jesus comes it will be to judge the living and the dead. From that perspective, such a perceived delay in the return of Jesus serves the purpose of extending God's kindness that it may lead to repentance (Romans 2:4).
- 3. We continue to pray, "Come, Lord Jesus." His coming will usher in the final defeat of Satan and the bodily resurrection of the dead to life everlasting. Amen.

May we all be prepared,

AN ADVENT HYMN

Hark, the glad sound! The Savior comes. The Savior promised long. Let every heart prepare a throne And every voice a song.

This hymn was written by Philip Doddridge in 1735. Doddridge was a pastor of a Dissenting church, which means that he did not accept the authority of the Church of England. He wrote this hymn and many others—perhaps 400 in all—not for publication but to be sung by his congregation. His congregation didn't use hymnals, but instead had someone sing the hymn line by line from the pulpit with the congregation repeating each line in turn.

Most of Doddridge's hymns were inspired by a particular scripture, and that was true of this hymn, which was inspired by Isaiah 61:1-2.

The Spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me to bring good news to the poor; he has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to those who are bound; to proclaim the year of the LORD's favor and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn...

When Jesus spoke in his hometown synagogue in Nazareth, he quoted those verses from Isaiah and then said, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing" (Luke 4:21). In other words, Jesus was saying that he had come to preach good news, to bind up those who were broken, to proclaim liberty to captives, and to comfort those who mourn. It is in celebration of this work of Christ that we sing this hymn.

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
