"There was a fire in the oven!" Those were the first words I heard from Annette when I got home one day last summer. While she was using the oven, one of the electric elements had started on fire. Thankfully, the fire went out when she turned off the oven.

After I shut off the circuit breaker to the oven, I inspected inside, underneath, and behind the oven. Dust had collected underneath it over the years, so I got the vacuum cleaner to pick up the dust.

Before starting the vacuum, I shined a flashlight on that blanket of dust. As I did so, I saw a little glint of reflected light. As I held the flashlight on that spot, I reached out to touch a small, shiny object.

When I picked it up, I realized it was the diamond to Annette's engagement ring, which had gone missing months before! When she first noticed that the stone had fallen out of its setting, we did a major search all through the house. We prayed, asking our Lord to help us find that diamond according to His will. When it didn't turn up early on, we continued to keep an eye out for it.

I believe our Lord used the oven event to answer our prayer. If the fire hadn't happened, we wouldn't have had to look under and behind that appliance to check for damage. And I believe our Lord guided me to use that flashlight. If I hadn't used it, I would have sucked up the diamond unknowingly and it would be gone.

Annette and I were very happy to get her diamond back. This experience reminds us that God loves us, cares for us, and answers our prayers according to His will. No need or concern of ours is too small to bring before our Lord.

In addition, our Lord protected us. We were not aware that the oven was becoming unsafe due to its age. By His grace, the fire small and brief. It caused no injury to Annette, and having that fire alerted us that it was time to replace that oven! And so, we give thanks to God for that oven fire!

Pastor's Perspective June 2023

"You, however, have followed my teaching, my conduct, my aim in life, my faith, my patience, my love, my steadfastness, my persecutions and sufferings that happened to me at Antioch, at Iconium, and at Lystra—which persecution I endured; yet from them all the Lord rescued me...But as for you, continue in what you have learned and have firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it and how from childhood you have been acquainted with the sacred writings, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus." 2 Timothy 3:10-11, 14-15

One of the things I have learned in life is that my experiences are not common among most individuals. There was a particular routine that was not to be questioned. Every Sunday morning (except for vacation) my dad took my brother and me to church. Yes, my dad took us to church. Mom worked night shift as a nurse, so she hardly attended. Not only did he take us to church, but he stayed. He was involved. By this very routine my father modeled the value of going to church for me and my brother.

A look around many sanctuaries throughout the United States and you'll see that most adults who come to church are women. This isn't to say that men do not believe in God, or believe in Jesus, but that they don't see the value of church in building that relationship with Jesus. Statistics point this out as Pew Research, a leading researcher of church practices, state that the percentage of men going to church weekly is 31 percent compared to women at 40 percent. Perhaps more concerning is that the percentage of men who pray daily is 46 percent compared to 64 percent of women.

In the passage above, Paul is intentional about mentoring Timothy in Christian faith. Not only is he a faith mentor but will also mentor Timothy as a pastor. I point out this passage to highlight the important role that men in particular have in raising their family in faith. One thing that has been consistent over the years is that when men are active in church, their family has a higher rate of being engaged in the church than those whose father does not attend.

Men. YOU MATTER! You make a difference in the life of your children. You make a difference in the life of the church. It is the way God intended. Yes, like all things we can be distracted. We are busy. We may be tired. We may find our lives pulled in different directions. We may have every intention of one day coming back to church even as the years pass by. I say this not as a word of judgement, but to encourage you to make your life with Jesus a priority.

I get it. Life is hard and we all make choices because we want what is best for our children. We make promises before God at their baptism to raise them up in faith, that along with your spouse or in my dad's case, without active participation from my mom, includes coming to church.

Not only do we men need to hear the good news of Jesus Christ, but we are also leaders of our families, a role that certain segments of society downplay or demean. Men, "Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it." Proverbs 22:6.

Don't worry if you're so tired you might fall asleep. Don't fear the rumblings your children may make. By your very example we men teach our children. They learn by hearing what we say and by observing what we do. Not only that, but let the church be a place where you can be present with other men as they seek to follow Jesus.
