THE FOOD OF ETERNAL LIFE

When Jesus was being tempted by the devil in the wilderness, He said, "It is written, 'Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God."

Matthew 4:4 (ESV)

By quoting that verse from Deuteronomy 8:3, Jesus is making it clear that people need to be nourished by the Word of God in order to live life as God intends. If a person doesn't eat physical food, they will die a physical death. And if a person is not nourished by God's Word, they will not have eternal life with Him.

The Holy Spirit gave Peter the faith to grasp this truth. In the 6th chapter of John's Gospel, when Jesus asked His twelve disciples if they wanted to stop following Him (v. 67), Peter answered, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life, and we have believed, and have come to know, that you are the Holy One of God." John 6:68-69 (ESV)

You and I eat physical food every day to keep our bodies alive. Jesus is saying that, as important as it is to eat physical food, it is **crucial** that we be nourished by God's Word on an ongoing basis.

In our congregation, there are many opportunities to be fed by the Word of God. First

of all, we are called to gather together every Sunday to be nourished by God's spoken and enacted Word in the Holy Communion service.

Our members are also invited to participate in Sunday School classes, Tuesday morning inperson Bible study, and Wednesday evening Bible study via Zoom.

In addition to gathering with others to be fed by God's Word, we are encouraged as individual followers of Jesus to read and meditate on Scripture daily during time spent alone with our Lord. Devotional materials (such as *The Upper Room*) are used by some members as a guide for this time alone with our Lord.

When Martha and Mary hosted Jesus and His disciples in their house, Mary chose to sit and listen to Jesus' teaching while Martha got herself distracted by the details of preparing a meal for her special guests. (See Luke 10:38-42.) Jesus commended Mary for choosing "the good portion" because she fed on the Word of God. By the grace of God, may we follow her example often!

Pastors Perspective October 2023

On this mountain the Lord of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well aged wine, of rich food full of marrow, of well-aged wine well refined. And he will swallow up on this mountain the covering that is spread over all nations. He will swallow up death forever; and the Lord God will wipe away tears from all faces, and the reproach of his people he will take away from all the earth, for the Lord has spoken. Isaiah 25:6-8

Over the course of my 25 plus years as an ordained pastor, I have officiated at many a funeral. I have presided over the funerals of very active members as well as individuals whom I had never met. The most common comment I have received when doing funerals for individuals I did not know or know well is "It must be hard to do a funeral for someone you didn't know." To the contrary, it is harder to do a funeral for someone I have come to know well. Why is that the case?

The first answer to that question is familiarity. In each congregation I have served, I have grown to know fellow brothers and sisters in Christ as we do ministry together. We worship together. We pray together. We study the word together. We serve together. I have come to love the people with whom I have been called to serve and with whom we have served the community together. I love you and am grateful to serve as your pastor as we go about the mission of Emanuel, "a community of faith, leading people to Christ." With that familiarity it is easier in the funeral for such active members to focus on the past and to focus on all the good things he or she had done in the congregation and community. With all due respect, while one doesn't want to ignore the life of the one lived, the focus must be on the future.

Death comes. The final breathe is breathed. The casket is closed and lowered into the grave. Yet, for the ones who believe in Jesus, death is not the end. The passage above is one of many passages throughout the scriptures that speak of the hope that is ours through Jesus.

What awaits us is not necessarily the earthly hobbies of this life. I can't tell you that we'll be golfing in that great golf course in the sky, or swimming in the great swimming pool in the sky or gardening in that great garden in the sky. What awaits us is a celebration akin to a feast. What awaits us is the ultimate healing. "...also, on either side of the river, the tree of life with its fruit each month. The leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations." (Revelation 22:2b) What awaits us is a place in God's house, "In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also." (John 14:2-3)

The fullness of God's Kingdom is free from all the pains, sufferings, trials and tibulations of this life. Gone will be the pain of seeing a loved one lose their memory to dementia. Gone will be the slow death that comes from numerous terminal diseases. Gone will be the heartache of unreconciled relationships. Gone will be the grief that seems to endlessly linger. Gone are the tears shed over the endings of this life.

Your funeral is an opportunity to proclaim the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ to those who may attend. It is the opportunity to speak to the hope and faith in Christ that sustains us in this life. It is by faith in Jesus Christ, that your last breath was not the end, but that of a new beginning. For when the Lord opens our eyes, there we shall behold him in beauty and righteousness, in the perfect peace that passes all understanding.

To aid you in planning for your funeral, the Worship and Music Committee commends to you a funeral planning packet that is available in the church narthex. The first couple of pages covers information that family members will need when putting together your obituary. The last half of the packet are suggested scripture passages that can be used as well as hymns you would like. Understand, I'm in no hurry to see anyone die, yet the reality is that the day will come for each of us short of Jesus'

return. When you complete the packet, please let those close to you know where they can find it when the information is needed. If you want, we can also keep a copy of it in the church filing cabinet.

"Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believers in me shall never die." John 11:25-26a. God bless,
