The final count of food items donated to the Soup Kitchen by Emanuel in response to the FEEDENE 2023 challenge. AND we have word that the soup kitchen will receive the \$500 that is awarded to the first 100 completed entries. Margie (soup kitchen coordinator) was beside herself.

This soup kitchen is a very special soup kitchen. They operate five days a week all year, providing for those who might not get a nutritious hot meal that day.

And they aren't just run-of-the-mill meals. Each day they are prepared from scratch, including at least a choice of an entrée, a starch, vegetable, bread and dessert. Depending on what they receive, there might be a fresh salad. There is a homemade soup served (again using what is available) during the winter months. This is a big favorite with the clients.

Let me tell you about one particular dessert Cheryl makes: bread pudding made from croissants donated by the local WaWa. And she even makes a topping. It is the best. That's not all she does with croissants—sometimes they serve a breakfast and she uses croissants to make French toast. Being dependent on what is available, they become quite inventive.

HELGI VIIRE

Meet our new associate member, Helgi Viire. Helgi was introduced to us by another congregant, Carol Parsons, who attends the same senior center. Helgi mentioned to her that her home church, Northville Estonian Lutheran Church, does not meet during the summer months. Carol told her about our congregation, so Helgi, not sure what to expect, came one Sunday just before we started holding services at the pavilion--and never left us. Now we see her the second and fourth Sundays of the month when her home church does not meet. Being an associate member allows her to maintain her membership in her Estonian congregation while enjoying all the amenities of Emanuel, except voting. Helgi has a story that rings so loudly right now. She, her mother, brother and sister were displaced persons after WWII, shifting between countries until they were sponsored by Seabrook Farms. She was 7-1/2 years old when they left Estonia and 12 when they arrived in the US. So they spent almost five years in limbo, not always having food or a bed. If you get a chance, ask her about her journey; it's remarkable how they survived.

Helgi attended nursing school and was employed as a nurse at Owens-Illinois. Her impression of Emanuel—she was "overwhelmed" with how Emanuel embraced her; she was immediately surrounded by the women from the church and made to feel welcome.

- Reimbursing the costs of our Dean and AMR Council members as they conduct the work of the AMR, and


 Covering the administrative costs that pertain to regular business of the region, the annual convocation, the theological conference and activities of the AMR Women of the NALC.

RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD

During a recent Bible study led by Pr. Mark, our group started talking about how the Scriptures make it clear that God wants relationship with all people.

Having a relationship with every person has always been His desire, and He has expressed that desire since He created our first parents. Adam and Eve originally lived in close relationship with God. However, they broke that loving relationship when they disobeyed Him. And since that critical moment, all people conceived and born into this world enter it separated from God by their sin.

God's plan to redeem and restore all people to Himself is based on His love for all humankind. As we study the books of the Old Testament, we see God's plan unfold as He chooses and forms the people of Israel. From this chosen people would come the Savior of the world. This Savior, to whom all the books of the Old Testament point, is the Son of God, Jesus Christ.

This Son of God, who was born of the virgin Mary, laid down His life and rose again to win for all people the forgiveness of their sins, so that they might be restored to right relationship with God the Father.

Jesus is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. No one comes to the Father except through Jesus Christ. (See John 14:6.) By the grace of God, those who believe in Jesus Christ and are baptized are restored to right relationship with the Father and are identified as members of the family of God.

When a person is baptized, they receive the Holy Spirit. Only by the active presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in the Church are we able to remain in right relationship with our Father in heaven. As we hear and receive the Gospel in Word and Sacrament, the Spirit continues to work in us faith in Jesus, that we may remain connected with our Father between now and when we see Him face to face.

Let us pray: Dear Father, thank You for answering Jesus' prayer to pour out the Holy Spirit upon Your people. According to Your will for us, may we not quench the Spirit but allow Him to continue His work in us, that we may remain in relationship with You through our belief in Your Son, Jesus Christ. Amen!

Oh, come, O Key of David, come,

One of the things we like least in life is waiting. It doesn't matter what we are waiting for, we generally don't like it. Who likes waiting in line for 45 minutes to ride a roller coaster at an amusement park? We don't; so many amusement parks will help you avoid such long waits with the purchase of a fast pass. Who wants to wait in the long lines of a grocery store? Well, you can check out by taking the self-checkout scanners, which are usually faster. Then there is traffic, which really tests our appetite (or lack thereof) for waiting. Waiting is one of the most counter cultural things we can do in life. Everything is designed and marketed toward us saving time (and money).

The church is called to be counter cultural. It means rejecting the values of the world which praises self-indulgence. Yes, that includes patient waiting, or what has been translated in the Bible as long-suffering.

The most significant wait we have as disciples of Jesus is for his promised return. Jesus himself stated that he does not know. "But concerning that day and hour no one knows, not even the angels of heaven or the Son, but the Father only." (Matthew 24:36)

There is great purpose in this time of waiting. Waiting is a time not of idleness, but preparation. Jesus illustrated the need for preparation in waiting with the Parable of the Tenants (Matthew 21:33-44), the Parable of the Wedding Feast (Matthew 22:2-14), the Parable of the Ten Virgins (Matthew 25:1-13) and the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30) to name a few. The Apostle Paul noted that the waiting for the coming judgement of God which accompanies the return of Jesus has an crucial purpose. "Or do you presume on the riches of his kindness and forbearance and patience, not knowing that God's kindness is meant to lead you to repentance?" (Romans 2:4)

The season of Advent is a time of active waiting. Lost in the hustle of all things on our personal lists to get done for Christmas is the focus on our spiritual preparation, that of actively waiting for Jesus return, even as we prepare to celebrate his first arrival. One of the ways in which the one holy catholic and apostolic church has done this through the centuries is through hymns. While the secular festivities of a Christmas holiday start even before Halloween, the church pumps the breaks to focus on our spiritual preparation. Yes, this is hard for us in the church because we fall too easily into the trappings of Christmas and the way we think the season should be celebrated.

This means that as you hear jingle bells and other secular or religious Christmas songs on the radio or over the speaker while you're shopping, the church is singing the advent hymns that speak to the coming of Christ, both his first and second coming. In other words, we are in active preparation mode of waiting.

So not every hymn in December is going to be a Christmas carol. There will be hymns that focus on that spiritual discipline of patient waiting. Yes, there will be Christmas hymns sung. Some of the favorites will be part of the Sunday school Christmas program. Others will be sung on Christmas Eve or at the Lessons and carols service on December 31st, which is part of the 12 days of Christmas.

In this Advent and coming Christmas season, I encourage you to reflect on the words of each of the hymns that we sing. In this, may you find the Holy Spirit at work deepening your faith and encouraging you in your walk as a follower of Jesus.
